 - 25-year partnership!






Austin Public Library

 - English as a Second Language instruction
 - Some of the most underserved populations in Houston
 - Allows the library to reach populations outside of normal scope

Dallas Public Library



- Chairs the Literacy Coalition of Greater Dallas
 - Supports communication between local literacy organizations
 - Completely changed the landscape of adult literacy in Dallas
 - Library is able to support literacy programs
